IVAL Bets on the European Come-Back

July 13, 2025

Summary

- IVAL continues to lean into Europe's resurgence, particularly Germany, while trimming exposure to the UK.
- Japan's recent lag has weighed on IVAL's relative performance.
- Despite short-term headwinds, IVAL remains significantly cheaper than its peers.

Recap

IVAL displayed moderate returns in June, up 2.15% (NAV)/2.04% (MKT), compared to Foreign Value's (3.12%) and Foreign Large Blend² funds (2.74%) on a NAV basis.

The Energy sector was IVAL's top contributor in June, adding 0.67% to monthly returns as Europe continues to move away from Russian energy dependence in the post-2022 landscape. Standout names included Tenaris (Italy), which alone contributed 0.23%—roughly 10% of IVAL's total net return for the month. Industrials were another winning sector, contributing 0.45% of return to the fund.

Month over month, IVAL doubled down on what's been working by increasing exposure to Industrials and Energy, with allocation weights rising 5.76% and 2.09%, respectively. Meanwhile, Consumer Staples saw the largest reduction, with a decrease of 2.04%.

Europe keeps climbing - IVAL leans in

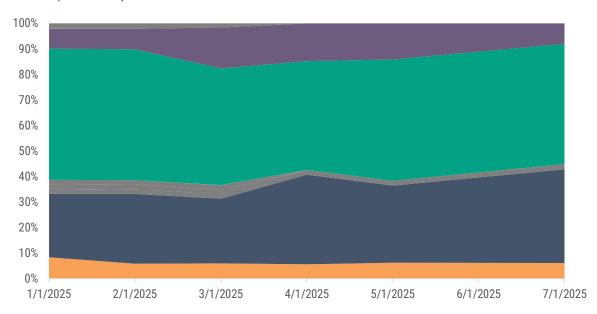
International markets have maintained their year-to-date momentum, with Europe in the midst of one of its strongest equity streaks relative to the United States in recent memory. **IVAL has leaned into that strength, increasing its allocation to developed Europe**. Germany, in particular, has seen a significant shift, with its allocation rising from 4% to 10% year to date. For context, the fund has historically devoted about a quarter of its capital to developed Europe, but that figure has recently climbed to approximately 37%—a notable shift that reflects the expanding opportunity set abroad.

IVAL isn't a momentum fund—so what's driving the reallocation?

As a refresher, IVAL seeks to invest in the top 10% cheapest stocks across a diversified set of developed markets outside the U.S. But IVAL isn't just a pure value fund. Within the universe of the 10% cheapest stocks, IVAL selects the top 50 names that also exhibit strong quality characteristics—such as profitability, financial stability, and improving operational efficiency.

In our view, quality is a critical complement to valuation, especially for investors aiming to avoid catching the so-called "falling knives." As a result, and while a secondary screen, the fund's quality screen can tactically influence sector and country allocations over time. While quality (momentum) isn't IVAL's goal, the fund can naturally tilt toward regions or industries where value and quality fundamentals are gaining strength.

More recently, IVAL has begun to adjust its positioning—trimming its U.K. exposure by 6.1%, and adding 6.5% to developed European stocks in response to shifting quality signals and relative value opportunities.

IVAL lags year-to-date... But it's not all bad news

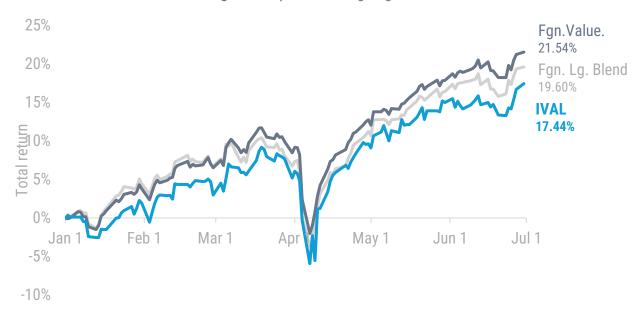
With IVAL's approach in mind, it's fair to ask why the fund has recently underperformed both its peers and the broader Foreign Large Blend category. After all, if international value stocks are surging ahead—and value is outperforming blend—shouldn't IVAL be pulling ahead of at least one of those groups? It's a natural question, and one that deserves a closer look. Is something broken here?

IVAL seeks to buy the cheapest, highest quality stocks—wherever they may be. Unlike many other funds that anchor to country-specific allocation targets, **IVAL takes a largely country-agnostic approach**. Historically, that's led to a consistent overweight to Japan, with the fund averaging around 49% exposure to the region.

2025 has been no different. IVAL continues to find plenty of opportunity in Japanese equities, holding an average weight of around 48% to Japan this year. And while international markets have had a strong run in 2025, some regions have clearly led the charge. Sure, with the benefit of hindsight, investors might have preferred Japan over the U.S.—but the real standouts have been in Europe. In fact:

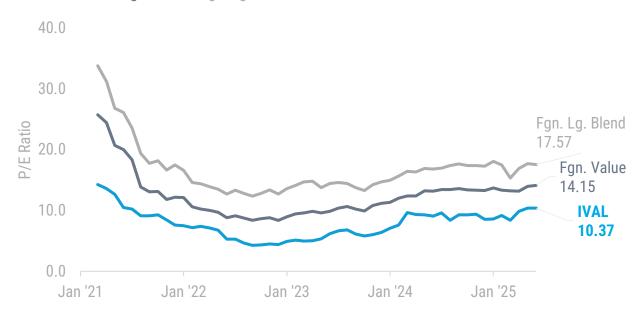
- In the developed world, Greece, Spain, Austria, Italy, and Germany have posted some of the strongest gains year to date, while Japan sits somewhere in the back of the pack.
- On the currency side, the euro has been a top performer against the dollar in 2025. The yen has held its own, but it hasn't packed quite the same punch.

That might sound like a sad ending—until you consider where IVAL is positioned heading into the second half of the year. Its overweight to Japan isn't incidental; it reflects a deliberate belief that this is where the best value opportunities remain. And while recent performance may not capture that fully, IVAL still stands out among its peers as the cheaper fund—offering investors a powerful setup going forward.

We remain committed to our disciplined process and believe that IVAL may have further room to run—especially if value continues to gain traction across international markets.

Top 10 Holdings by P/E Ratio

IVAL's construction continues to position it as a strong diversifier, with just **6.71% overlap**, through 6/30/2025, with a typical Foreign Large Blend strategy⁴. Smaller overlaps typically signal **lower correlation and greater potential for diversification** when paired with their benchmarks. In IVAL's case, we believe its concentrated focus on the cheapest names is a key driver behind its historically lower correlation—76% with Foreign Large Blend—compared to the Foreign Value category, which sits much closer at 97%.

Currently, only one of IVAL's top 10 holdings—ranked by P/E ratio—has a weighting greater than 0.10% in the Foreign Large Blend benchmark, while three have no representation in the benchmark at all.

For investors seeking to diversify their U.S. and International market exposures, we believe that IVAL proposes a compelling value proposition from a portfolio construction standpoint.

Return drivers

Currently, the portfolio is tightly focused on smaller companies within the Industrials, Consumer Cyclicals, and Materials sectors—together making up roughly 64% of total exposure—reflecting a strong risk-on posture. For July, IVAL is positioned to benefit if:

- International risk-on sentiment continues.
- Japanese stocks begin picking up momentum.
- Currency trends remain favorable against the U.S. dollar.

We also want to be clear: while international markets have had a strong year relative to the U.S., we believe there's still significant runway—particularly in value stocks. For investors who haven't yet made the move into international equities, there's still time to get in the bandwagon. IVAL, with its focus on the cheapest stocks in attractively priced markets, is well-positioned to capture this shift in global sentiment and potentially deliver compelling returns going forward.

Note on category average methodology

Constituents of a given category are determined by YCharts. As of 4/30/2024, the calculation method used to determine the category average's returns changed to account for potentially different inception dates. Previously, a straight average of constituent funds' total return net asset value (NAV) was used to determine the category's average total return NAV; the percent change of the category average NAV was then used to calculate returns. As of 4/30/2024, total returns for the category are now found using a straight average of the total NAV return (percent change) for a given frequency (daily, weekly, monthly, etc.). There may be instances where the straight average of the constituent funds' NAV returns may be higher or lower than the straight average of the total NAV return. As of 4/30/2024, all category average returns are calculated using the straight average of the constituent funds' total NAV return for a given frequency.

Category average constituent selection criteria

Unless otherwise noted, the given category is represented by the 50 biggest funds based on assets under management (AUM). The AUM figure is point-in-time and is not retroactively applied to constituent funds. In the event fewer than 50 funds are available in a given category, all funds are used in to calculate returns. Unless otherwise indicated, mutual funds are excluded from category average constituents. Funds that may have been open for investment over the given period but are no longer active are not included. The number of constituent funds in a given category average may affect represented returns. In the event of multiple share classes, the share class with the highest AUM is referenced. In the event of a duplicate ETFs and mutual funds from the same fund family, the ETF is referenced. Category returns are a straight average of the total return of the constituent funds over the given period.

Wherever possible, we reference the 50 biggest funds by AUM to provide what we believe to be a reasonable sample of the most popular strategies that includes a mix of passive and active approaches. The highest AUM funds tend to have more established track records, providing what we believe to be a reasonable basis for returns. We reference all funds in the category in the event there are fewer than 50 funds open for investment.

RBICS Sector Definitions

Business Services is composed of companies that offer services targeted toward businesses, including administrative, support, janitorial, and professional services.

Consumer Cyclicals is composed of companies that offer products targeted toward individual or household use, including apparel, toys, school and art supplies, and electronics; motor vehicle sales and rental, and automotive parts and services; building materials, garden supplies, furniture, appliances, cabinetry, window treatments, and carpets

Consumer Non-Cyclicals is composed of companies that offer products targeted toward individual and consumer needs, including groceries, beverages, health and personal care items, kitchenware, decorative items, and household cleaning products

Consumer Services is composed of companies that offer services targeted toward individuals, including accommodation; food and beverage retail; gaming, arts, entertainment and recreation; and television, radio, film, and print media

Energy is composed of companies that primarily engage in oil and gas exploration and production, pipeline transportation, refineries, and oil and gas equipment and services; leasing, mining and processing of coal and coke; uranium, radium, and vanadium mining



Finance is composed of companies that offer financial products and services in banking, insurance, investment, specialty finance, and real estate

Healthcare is composed of companies that offer products and services that are designed, developed, and utilized in the promotion of health and well-being, including medical services, health plans, medical devices, and biopharmaceuticals

Industrials is composed of companies that offer products and services for industrial use or with applications in aerospace, defense, or security; transportation, construction, and related infrastructure; or farming, including equipment and machinery manufacture, wholesale, rental, and distribution and related support activities

Non-Energy Materials is composed of companies that offer basic and intermediate material products, including nonenergy mining; forestry, timber logging, and lumber production; and chemical, plastic, paper, metal, and textile manufacturing

Technology is composed of companies that offer semiconductor, electronic, and optics based products and related software and services that directly or indirectly facilitate the creation, transfer, storage, manipulation, or interpretation of data, audio, and video

Telecommunications is composed of companies that offer services designed to promote or enhance transmission of voice, data, and video over various communications mediums, including cable, satellite, terrestrial-based wireless, and wireline mediums

Utilities is composed of companies that offer gas, electricity, and water services delivered directly to residential and commercial users

NA or Other is a catchall designation for cash, cash alternatives, or holdings that may have been delisted in the proceeding periods from when a fund may have held the security.
